Girl Scouts Heart of the Hudson, Inc. strives to fulfill the mission of the Girl Scout Movement by helping all girls reach their full potential. Through the four pillars of the Girl Scout Movement; Life Skills, STEM, Outdoors, and Entrepreneurship GSHH is building the next generation of girl leaders full of courage, confidence, and characters who will make the world a better place.

Girl Scouts is the preeminent leadership development program for girls. The Girl Scout program has proven results; research shows that Girl Scout Alums are more likely to hold leadership roles, be socially active, and engage in volunteerism on a regular basis.

This year marks the 109th year of the Girl Scout Movement. The year played out much differently than we planned and unlike anything we've done before and we came through and made the year a success! Our resilience paid off in time to enjoy the 2nd Annual Girl Scouts Love State Parks weekend in September.

In the height of cookie season, COVID-19 struck New York and our girls were instructed to go inside – and parents began working from home – upending the traditional channels of selling. Embodying the Girl Scout spirit and motto of "Be Prepared," these challenges did not slow down or stop our girls from meeting their sales goals as they shifted toward digital selling, contactless pickup, and continuing to collect donations for Operation Cookie Drop.

We move forward into 2021 with hope and optimism, but with the knowledge that there are still challenges ahead. It has never been more clear that Girl Scouting is relevant and necessary to girls' lives. In a time when so much in their lives has been canceled or put on indefinite hold, Girl Scouts is still there. Proclamation

Whereas, those who have earned it have shown the same outstanding leadership skills, determination, and resilience that have made Girl Scouts' highest award a unique rite of passage for young women across the Movement;
