The past year was challenging. With the continued uncertainty of navigating life amid the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, many families were unsure where Girl Scouts fit into their “new normal”, hybrid school schedules and safety restrictions. It was challenging to reach new Girl Scouts. However, our girls and volunteers remained committed to making the best of a difficult situation and having a great Girl Scout year! GSHH’s membership topped 13,000 girls by the end of September, an incredible increase from where we started the year! This number showed that as people’s comfort levels increased, they were ready and excited to return to Girl Scouts!

GSHH continued to provide virtual programs throughout the year, including a virtual kickoff event in October 2020 that featured representatives from WAGGGS and interactive programs hosted by GSHH departments. As months progressed, GSHH saw troops throughout the council engage in community service, support those in need through food and clothing drives, and make sure the holidays were bright for everyone.

GSHH was thrilled to provide a drive-through Silver and Gold Award Ceremony in June at Camp Addisone Boyce and hold in-person camp sessions at CAB and Rock Hill to round out a challenging year.

The council exceeded its early renewal goals and saw increased interest from recruitment events as a sign of things to come. We are looking forward to continuing this positivity and optimism into the new year.

Girl Scout Cadettes in grades 6-8 can pursue earning their Silver Award on their own or in a small group with Girl Scouts who are similarly passionate about solving an identified issue in their community.

To earn a Silver Award, girls are asked to contribute 50 or more hours in a Take Action project that uses the skills they've gained over the years, incorporates lessons gained from the journey they completed, and takes the Girl Scout Promise and Law to heart.

Girl Scouts Heart of the Hudson was happy to welcome the 2021 class of Silver Award Girl Scouts to Camp Addisone Boyce in June 2021 to acknowledge and celebrate their accomplishments as a group along with their families.

2021 Summer Camp

After a hiatus in 2020, in-person summer camp returned in the summer of 2021. Girl Scouts Heart of the Hudson's Girl Experience team held successful camp sessions at Camp Addisone Boyce in Rockland County and Rock Hill Camp in Putnam County.

To ensure the safety of the campers and staff, camp sessions were run at 50% capacity and extra cleaning and safety protocols were followed closely. This hard work paid off as both camps were happy to report zero COVID-19 cases at either location!

In 2021, of the camp session GSHH offered at Camp Addisone Boyce and Rock Hill Camp, almost all were filled to capacity or had just a few spots remaining.

Girls were thrilled to be participating in Girl Scout traditions like opening and closing camp fires, all camp activities, and color war. Each camp session comes with the opportunity to work on a Girl Scout badge that fits the theme of that week. For example, girls attending the Junior Animal Expert session at CAB had the chance to work on the Animal Habitats Badge and those attending the Brownie Snacktastic session at Rock Hill had the chance to work on the Snacks Badge. Because GSHH's camp sessions are girl-led, the campers help make decisions that affect the group, and are given a chance to help plan the week – so it's all about them, and doing what makes them happiest.

In these challenging times, GSHH was proud to offer its campers a little bit of normalcy and a return to routine as they prepared to return to full-time in-person school.

Not only did the girls have to get creative to meet their goals, council staff did too when coordinating the cookie delivery in April 2021. Throughout the council, GSHH staged drive up cookie delivery. Staff and volunteers had each troop's cookie order staged prior to arrival to reduce contact and make for a stress-free pickup experience. Leaders were happy with this innovation and hoped to see it continue.

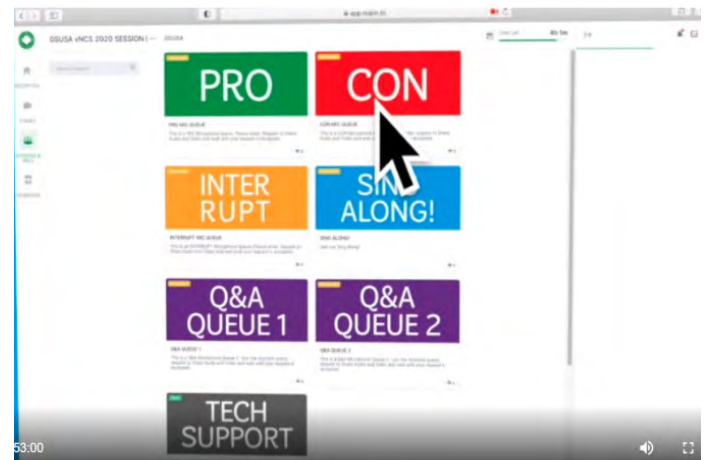

Girl Scouts from all areas of the council participated and made a big difference in their communities during a difficult holiday season.



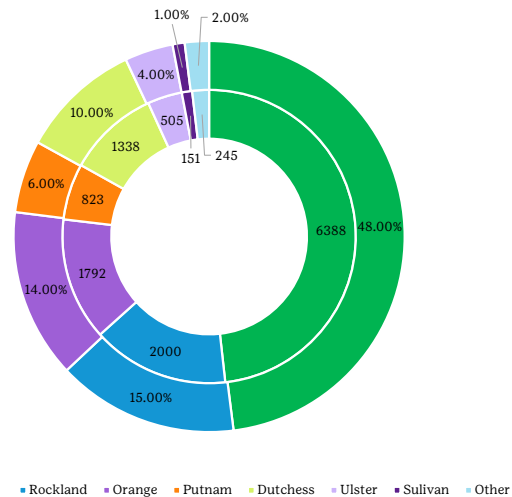

MY21 Girl Membership by County

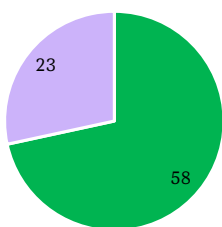

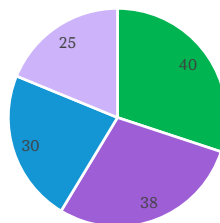

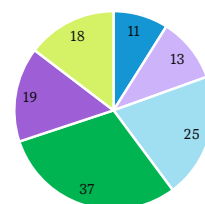


STEM Entrepreneurship Life Skills Outdoor

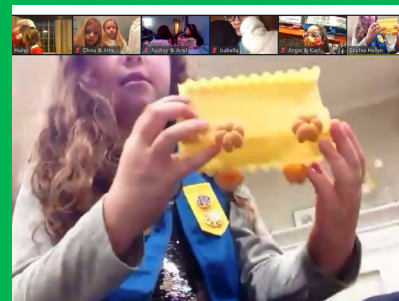

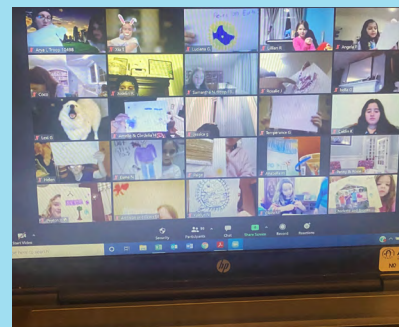
Staff-Led Virtual Troop 7002

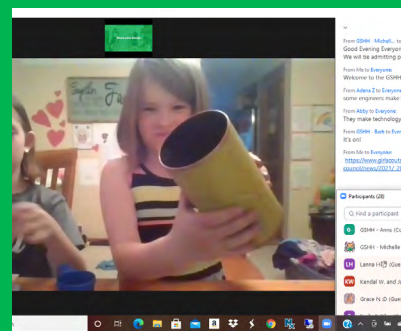
World Thinking Day 2021

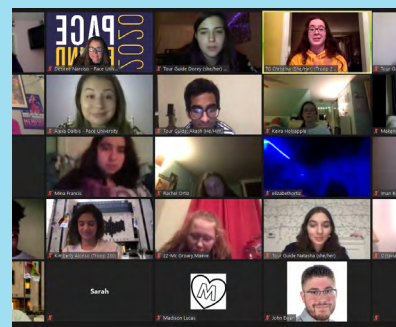
AT&T Virtual STEM Event

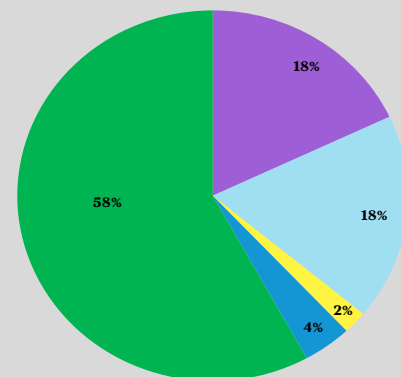

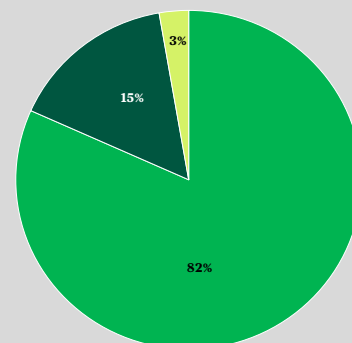
